GENESIS

1. What does Genesis teach about God's power and authority?

Genesis opens by showing that God speaks and creation obeys. His word brings the universe into existence, demonstrating unmatched authority and absolute sovereignty. He forms man in His image, judges sin, confuses languages, and directs nations. Nothing in Genesis happens outside His command. The book reveals a God who rules, commands, judges, blesses, and sustains all things by His power.

2. How does the creation account shape a biblical worldview?

The creation account establishes that life is purposeful, not accidental. Humanity is created in God's image, giving every person dignity, responsibility, and accountability. Marriage, morality, work, and rest all begin in Genesis. The book shatters the idea of random origins and presents a God-centered world where humans are designed to know Him, honor Him, and answer to Him. Genesis grounds the entire biblical worldview in a real, historical beginning.

3. What evidence supports Noah's flood?

Genesis describes a global catastrophe that reshaped the entire planet. The bursting of the fountains of the deep, the covering of the highest mountains, and the settling of the ark on Ararat all point to a worldwide event. The planet's surface—covered mostly in water, marked by vast sediment layers, and filled with fossils—aligns perfectly with a sudden, global judgment rather than slow geological processes. The Flood explains the world we see far better than evolutionary speculation.

4. Why is Genesis foundational to the gospel?

Genesis explains the origin of sin, death, and humanity's separation from God. Without Genesis, the cross makes no sense. The fall of Adam brought judgment upon the human race, which is why redemption is necessary. The promise of a coming Savior begins right here, setting the stage for everything that follows. Genesis is the opening chapter of the gospel story, explaining why we need salvation and how God began unfolding His plan to provide it.

5. How does Genesis 3:15 point to Jesus?

Genesis 3:15 contains the first prophecy of a Redeemer. The “seed of the woman” would crush the serpent’s head while suffering a wound Himself. This points to Christ’s virgin birth, His victory over Satan, and His suffering on the cross. From the moment sin entered the world, God announced that a Savior would come. Jesus is the fulfillment of the promise that someone born of a woman would destroy the works of the devil.

6. How can you explain Genesis to someone skeptical of miracles?

Genesis confronts skepticism by presenting the God who created everything by His word. If God can speak galaxies into existence, no miracle in Scripture is difficult for Him. The real issue is not miracles but whether God exists. When someone acknowledges a Creator, the supernatural becomes reasonable. Genesis invites skeptics to consider their own origins and see that belief in a powerful Creator makes far more sense than believing everything came from nothing.

7. What can we learn about faith from Abraham?

Abraham trusted God's promises even when they seemed impossible. He obeyed God's call, waited for what was promised, and was willing to sacrifice Isaac because he believed God could raise the dead. His life shows that faith rests not on circumstances but on God's character. Abraham believed what God said, even when he could not see how God would fulfill it. His example reminds us that real faith takes God at His word.

8. What lessons does Genesis teach about sin and consequence?

Genesis exposes the destructive power of sin. Adam and Eve's disobedience brought death. Cain's jealousy brought murder. Human corruption brought the Flood. Pride at Babel brought divine confusion. Sin always damages, spreads, and destroys. Genesis shows that God is patient, but He is also just, and He will judge sin. 9. How do the patriarchs show God's grace?

The patriarchs were deeply flawed, yet God remained faithful to them. Abraham struggled with fear, Isaac showed favoritism, Jacob deceived, and Joseph's brothers acted wickedly. Yet God worked through their failures, preserved His promises, and carried out His redemptive plan. Genesis highlights God's kindness, patience, and faithfulness to unworthy people. 10. How does Genesis strengthen your faith in God's promises?

Genesis shows a God who keeps His word. He promised a flood, and it came. He promised a nation from Abraham, and it began. He promised a Savior, and the line was preserved. God's timing may be slow by human standards, but it is perfect. Genesis builds confidence in a God who never lies, never fails, and always completes what He begins. His promises are as sure today as they were in the beginning.

EXODUS

1. What does Exodus reveal about God's character?

Exodus reveals a God who is powerful, faithful, and holy. He judges Egypt's idols, redeems His people, and keeps His covenant promises. He is patient with Israel's failures, yet He does not overlook sin. When He gives the Law, He shows that His commands reflect His own unchanging nature. Exodus displays a God who saves, leads, protects, and dwells among His people with unmatched authority.

2. How does the Passover foreshadow Christ?

The Passover shows that deliverance comes only through the blood of an innocent substitute. The lamb had to be without blemish, and its blood had to be applied for judgment to pass over. This points clearly to Jesus, the Lamb of God whose blood saves from the wrath to come. Just as Israel escaped death under the shelter of the lamb's blood, believers are saved by looking to Christ and trusting His sacrifice.

3. Why are the Ten Commandments still important?

The Ten Commandments reveal God's moral standard and expose our sin. They show what righteousness looks like and make clear that all have failed to keep God's Law. The commandments function like a mirror, revealing guilt and driving sinners to seek mercy. God wrote them with His own finger to emphasize their authority. They remain essential because they bring the knowledge of sin and point people toward their need for the Savior.

4. What lessons can we learn from Israel's complaining?

10. What does Exodus teach about trust in God's deliverance?

Exodus teaches that God is completely trustworthy even when circumstances look impossible. When Israel stood trapped between Pharaoh and the Red Sea, God opened a way where there was none. He proved that His timing is perfect and His power is limitless. Exodus strengthens faith by showing that God keeps His promises and delivers His people with wisdom and strength.

LEVITICUS

1. Why is Leviticus important for understanding Jesus' sacrifice?

Leviticus reveals the seriousness of sin and the necessity of atonement. Every sacrifice shows that sin requires the shedding of blood and that a substitute must die so the guilty can go free. These sacrifices were pictures of the perfect sacrifice of Jesus who offered Himself once for all. 2. What does it teach about God's holiness?

Leviticus shows that God is absolutely holy and that every detail of worship must reflect His purity. God calls His people to be holy because He is holy, showing that holiness is not optional. The regulations regarding sacrifice, conduct, and worship reveal that God cannot be approached casually. The book emphasizes reverence for God and a life set apart for Him.

3. How do the sacrifices point forward to the cross?

Although the ceremonial laws are fulfilled in Christ, the principles of Leviticus remain essential because they reveal God's holiness and the seriousness of sin. 9. What does this book teach about approaching God?

NUMBERS

Numbers teaches that faith is not based on circumstances but on the character of God. Trust grows when we rely on His word rather than our feelings.

2. How does God remain faithful despite disobedience?

God continued to lead, feed, protect, and correct Israel even when they rebelled. He disciplined them but did not abandon them. Numbers reveals a God who is patient and consistent, keeping His promises even to a stubborn people. His faithfulness does not depend on human performance but on His own nature.

3. What does the bronze serpent teach about salvation?

The bronze serpent shows that salvation comes through looking in faith to God's provision. The people were dying and could not save themselves. All they could do was look and live. Jesus used this event to point to His own crucifixion, showing that sinners are saved by looking to Him in faith. 4. What leadership lessons are found in Moses's life?

8. How can we avoid the mistakes Israel made?

A heart focused on God's faithfulness will not fall into the unbelief that marked Israel's wandering. The book calls us to walk by faith and not by sight.

2. How does Deuteronomy highlight the importance of loving God?

This love leads to devotion, obedience, and continual remembrance of His word. JOSHUA

1. What does Joshua teach about courage

Joshua shows that true courage comes from knowing God's character and trusting His commands. God told Joshua to be strong and courageous because He would be with him wherever he went. Joshua's boldness was rooted not in confidence in himself, but in confidence in God's presence and God's word. The book teaches that courage grows when believers obey God even when circumstances seem overwhelming, remembering that God goes before His people and fights their battles.

2. How does God fulfill promises

God fulfilled every promise He made to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob by giving Israel the land He swore to their fathers. From the crossing of the Jordan to the fall of Jericho and the defeat of powerful kings, God proved that His word never fails. Joshua emphasizes that not one word of God fell to the ground. This shows that God keeps His promises perfectly, in His timing, and according to His wisdom. His faithfulness in Joshua assures believers that they can trust every promise He has made.

3. What do you learn from Rahab

Rahab's story shows the power of faith and the mercy of God. She believed the reports about the God of Israel and acted on that belief by protecting the spies. Her faith led to salvation for her and her family, and she became part of the lineage that led to Jesus. Rahab demonstrates that God saves anyone who turns to Him in faith, regardless of their past. Her life shows that God delights in redeeming the unlikely and using them for His purposes.

4. What happens when Israel compromises

When Israel compromised with the Gibeonites or failed to drive out the enemies God commanded them to remove, the results were lasting trouble and spiritual decline. Compromise always opened the door to temptation, false worship, and conflict. Joshua reveals that obedience brings blessing, while compromise brings confusion and loss. The book warns that even small concessions to sin or unbelief can produce great damage over time.

5. How does Joshua point to Christ

Joshua points to Christ as the One who leads God's people into the true promised rest. Joshua brought Israel into the land, but Jesus brings believers into eternal life and spiritual victory. Joshua conquered earthly enemies, but Christ conquers sin, death, and the devil. Joshua's leadership, obedience, and faithfulness foreshadow the greater Deliverer who perfectly fulfills the will of God and brings His people into the fullness of God's promises.

6. What role does leadership play

Leadership in Joshua is marked by obedience, courage, and dependence on God's word. Joshua listened to the Lord, sought His direction, and followed His commands even when they seemed unusual. His leadership united the people and directed them toward faithfulness. The book shows that godly leadership influences others toward obedience and strengthens the entire community. Leaders who fear God and follow His word bring stability, direction, and spiritual strength.

7. What does this book teach about inheritance

Joshua teaches that inheritance is a gift from God, given by His promise and received through obedience. Israel's inheritance was not earned but granted by God's covenant faithfulness.
